Features of Indian constitution:

1. The bulkiest constitution of the world, 2. Rigidity and flexibility, 3. Parliamentary system of government, 4. Federal system with a unitary bias, 5. Fundamental rights and fundamental duties, 6. Directive principles of state policy:

These are mentioned in Part III of the Indian Constitution in articles 12-35. They were taken from the Constitution of the USA.

Fundamental Duties:

These are mentioned in Part IV A of the Indian Constitution in the article 51A. They were borrowed from the Constitution of the former Soviet Union or USSR.
